Do You Know the Real Becky Shields? by Sherry Alimi

Being new to Eta, I really didn't know Becky Shields. It took me a while to connect her face to the name I had heard many times at American Lutheran Church, my church. But when I was tasked to interview her as a candidate for the Omicron State Achievement Award, I was able to connect the dots. A Phoenix native, she taught in San Bernardino,CA and Glendale AZ. In 1960 she moved to Prescott because her son had asthma, and Prescott was recommended for his health. She taught Kindergarten until her retirement. What can I say about our 50 year member, Becky Shields? I can say that although she has been retired from teaching Kindergarten for many years, she is not sitting back and taking it easy. Becky is a pillar of American Lutheran Church, a pioneer in the ministry of prayer at ALC and in the community.

Becky heads the entire Prayer Ministry which is an umbrella for various prayer groups. WOW, Women of Wisdom, is a program of bible study and prayer in our community. Becky was one of the original founders of Prescott's WOW and still works to choose the various book offerings, te aches some of the them and heads the prayer portion of the program. WOW has three sessions per year and is attended by over 200 participants each session, most of whom do not belong to ALC. "Walk Through Bethlehem" is a well-known and beloved Christmas offering in northern Arizona. Originally two weekends and now only one, members of ALC men, women and children in costume help transport the visitors to the time of the birth of Christ. The lower level of the church is decorated into a market place with food tastings and beggar children. At the end of the tour the angels announce the birth of Christ and visitors go into the stable to see living portrayals of Mary, Joseph, and Jesus with live animals and shepherds. Becky was one of the founders of this holiday classic and provides the prayer component for anyone requesting prayer.

Becky also originated the Pastors Prayer Partners at ALC, a national program begun 20 years ago which focuses on praying for pastors. The ALC pastors provide a monthly schedule of activities that they are carrying out and indicate special needs in their lives for prayer from the team. Becky heads this important prayer team and organizes the yearly prayer luncheon. Becky heads the Prayer Team for the church. This group receives the prayer concerns of the congregation. They are available for prayer after each of the three Sunday services and then meet on Mondays at ALC to pray the concerns collected. The members then pray during the week for these concerns in their homes. Another type of prayer group is the Miracle Prayer Time which meets Tuesday afternoons. Members needing specific prayers for catastrophic illness or concerns can come to this group. It can include the laying on of hands during the prayers. Becky got the AGLOW ministry going in Prescott in 1977. It is an international program consisting of women in prayer. There are monthly luncheons with prayer and worship in a local restaurant. AGLOW is active in 170 countries focusing on the power of prayer. Overseas there is an emphasis on feeding, clothing the needy.

Another important program that Becky has spearheaded is an outreach in our community to the homeless, the unemployed, the poor, needy and hungry and those in recovery. This program originally began many years to ago to provide a meal and worship to these specific groups. ALC provides a meal on Sunday afternoon and then the diners can stay for a late Sunday worship service at ALC. About 40-60 people come for this meal. Becky makes sure that meals are provided for each Sunday. Some members make snacks for those who arrive, sandwiches they can take home with them. In addition, Becky is involved in a prayer group with a Baptist church, Prayer Walking and Prayer Driving which is walking or driving in neighborhoods and praying for specific or general needs. For example, one branch of this group would get up early and walk the grounds of our local middle school and pray for the students, for the disappearance of drugs and violence, for the teachers and administrators. Becky also has been involved in Child Evangelism in the community, holding classes in her home and reaching out to unchurched children. These prayer ministries are very time consuming. For example, Becky goes to church by 8 am each Sunday and is there until 5 pm when the Afternoon Meal is over; then she returns Monday morning for the prayer concerns. It is amazing that in addition to these projects she has ongoing each week, Becky participates in Jubilate Choir, a women's singing group. She ushers, greets and reads the lessons and also is a communion assistant on occasion. She also visits nursing homes and shut-ins from the church.

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Becky has taken to heart the Bible verse about praying unceasingly. She serves as an example of faith, hope and charity. She lives to serve the "least of these". She is a perfect example of what the Founders had in mind when they created Delta Kappa Gamma. She has devoted her life to the first purpose of the Society: to unite women educators of the world in a genuine spiritual fellowship. Emphasis on the "spiritual"!
